Basic Literacy Resource for the Deaf Produced by NorQuest College

"... the average reading achievement of deaf students completing school is at fourth grade level." The push to inclusive education means more and more children are mainstreamed and with greater access to Internet, e-mail, real-time captioning, close-captioned TV and movies as well as TTY – reading and writing in English is no longer an option for adults who are Deaf. As more Deaf students seek upgrading, instructors need to be aware of their special needs and challenges. Bill Persall and Flo Brokop, members of the Learning Support Services team at NorQuest College in Edmonton (http://www. norquest.ca), have documented reading instruction strategies that are effective with adult students who are Deaf and have developed a CD containing beginning level stories from the Grass Roots Readers Series © with accompanying American Sign Language (ASL).

NorQuest College offers academic upgrading, ESL and skills training programs to approximately 10,000 students in Edmonton and satellite campuses in Northern Alberta.

Approximately 2/3 of students enrolled in Employment Preparation Courses

by Flo Brokop* and Academic Upgrading (from basic literacy to high school credit courses) receive some form of support from the Learning Support Services unit. This semester, there are eleven students who are Deaf enrolled in a variety of programs at the College and an



additional three to four students are expected to begin classes next semester. In addition to interpretive services, all Deaf students receive one-on-one tutorial assistance. Most students meet regularly with Bill Persall, an educational assistant who is Deaf. Through communicating in ASL, Bill clarifies assignments, fills in necessary background information, and develops students' abilities to communi-

The focus of this five-month project was to document the teaching strategies used by Bill and develop an instructional resource for students that incorporate best practices for students who are Deaf.

An overriding principle of this project, which is supported by research in literacy education for students who are Deaf, is that when literacy learning involves two languages, competencies in the first language need to be used to support learning in the second language. For this reason, the basic stories on the CDs include video clips of the English text signed in ASL. Pre-reading activities that accompany each story include exercises that develop

background information and familiarize the student with English syntax, idiomatic expressions and vocabulary. Although these CDs will not be available for wider distribution, the project coordinators are attempting to secure funding to develop similar resources that will be available to educators of students who are Deaf. They are also looking for potential partners.

The Parent - Child Literacy Strategy of Alberta Learning by Keith Anderson, Manager, Family Literacy, Alberta Learning

Alberta Learning is investing \$1.1 million annually into the cross-ministry Parent-Child Literacy Strategy so that parents of pre-school children across the province become actively aware of the importance of introducing their children to books at an early age and, as their children's first teachers, knowledgeable of how to increase their children's possibilities of being successful in school.

Input from the Community and Stakeholders

The Parent-Child Literacy Strategy was developed by a cross-ministry team with input from a survey of 69 family literacy programs and a Think Tank held in June 2000. The participants at the June 2000 Think Tank included representation from Aboriginal, francophone and immigrant communities as well as schools, libraries, child care agencies, health units, family service agencies, funding bodies, post-secondary institutions, adult literacy program participants and others.

The Think Tank participants refined the objectives and guiding principles for the Strategy and identified the Strategy's key components – awareness raising; support to programs; training; needs assessment and evaluation; and provincial coordination.

Purpose and Objectives

The Parent-Child Literacy Strategy focuses on approaches integrating adult literacy instruction and early oral language development for children from birth to age six for economically and socially disadvantaged families.

The objectives of the Parent-Child Literacy Strategy are to:

- enhance the oral language, early literacy and social interaction skills of children from birth to age six so that they are better able to achieve success at home, school, and the community;
- strengthen and build the basic literacy skills of parents;
- support and foster the involvement of parents in their children's learning; and
- develop and enhance community-based partnerships that support the development of language and literacy skills of families.

Guiding Principles

The Strategy is guided by the following principles.

The sooner the better – The more effective campaigns. approaches are those that provide early supports for families and promote healthy positive behaviours.

2. Support The Company C

Supportive of parents – Because the early years are critical for the healthy growth of a child, some of the most effective ways of helping children is assisting their parents in caring for their child's physical, emotional and intellectual needs.

Family focused – Recognizes that the needs of children are in most cases best met within the context of the family, culture and community.

Culturally appropriate – Recognizes and respects the culture, spirituality, and traditions of children and families.

Comprehensive, integrated and sustained – Responses to the needs of families and children require comprehensive, integrated and longer-term approaches.

Capacity building – Recognizes and responds to the needs of children by building the capacity of families and communities to meet those needs.

Community-based partnerships – Preventive approaches are most effective when they are comprehensive, community-based interventions that involve many community partners and are readily accessible to families at convenient community sites.

Builds on what already exists – Recognizes and builds on the expertise, programs and community-based partnerships that already exist.

Best practice – Initiatives for children and families will be based on sound early literacy and adult literacy principles and practice informed by empirically validated research and experience.

Accountable – Effective initiatives will have an appropriate accountability structure, and will account regularly for decisions, choices and outcomes.

Summary of Strategy Activities

The Strategy is being implemented through a partnership between six Alberta government ministries and the *Centre for Family Literacy* in Edmonton, with the assistance of the literacy community.

1. Awareness Raising

- The Centre for Family Literacy has developed packages including a family literacy video, an information kit, and a PowerPoint presentation for use by family literacy programs around the province.
- The Centre has researched and produced "Literacy Happens: A Resource Manual for Community Literacy Awareness Training."
- The first three special issues on Family Literacy of *English Express*, a newspaper for adults who are improving their English reading skills, were published. There will be a total of eight special issues on Family Literacy.
- A working group will be formed to develop an awareness raising strategy that will build on existing campaigns

2. Support to Programs

- The Centre for Family Literacy has consulted with family literacy practitioners and finalized "Good Practice Statements for Family Literacy".
- The Centre has also undertaken a review of outreach strategies for family literacy programs and produced "Pathways Sourcebook: A Guide for family literacy coordinators and facilitators to attract parents into community programs."
- Alberta Learning released the Family Literacy Initiative Fund Guidelines in January 2002 and will

do so again in 2003. Nonprofit organizations can apply for funding for projects up to three years in length to provide family literacy programs for economically and socially disadvantaged families with pre-school children.

- Literacy Coordinators of Alberta organized two information sessions to help launch the Family Literacy Initiative Fund.
- Pilot projects are taking place in two Child and Family Services Regions to create partnerships between family literacy programs and home visitation collaboratives.

3. Training

- The Centre for Family Literacy provided foundational training in March 2002 for 40 participants
- The Centre provided family literacy models
- training in June 2002 for 60 participants.
- The Centre developed and provided family literacy training to home visitors in the two pilot regions.
- A survey was completed to identify training topics. More training is being planned.

4. Needs Assessment and Evaluation

- The Centre for Family Literacy is completing an inventory of evaluation tools and strategies used by family literacy programs.
- The Centre is also developing an assessment tool to be used by home visitors in identifying the literacy needs of families.
- Alberta Learning is developing an evaluation framework and strategy.

5. Provincial Coordination

- A team led by Alberta Learning with representatives from Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development; Children's Services; Health and Wellness; Human Resources and Employment; and Solicitor General is implementing the Strategy. A key role of the team is to ensure that the strategy is coordinated with and complementary to other early childhood development and adult learning initiatives in Alberta.
- Yvon Laberge, a family literacy specialist, is contracted to support the Implementation Team and Community Programs, Alberta Learning, which takes the lead for the strategy.

The Implementation Team gained further input from stakeholders through a Second Family Literacy Think Tank held in May 2002, organized and facilitated by the *Alberta Association* for *Adult Literacy*.



Here are some suggestions for reading aloud to children.

- Make reading books an enjoyable experience. Choose a comfortable place where the children can sit near you. Be enthusiastic about reading. Show the children that reading is an interesting & rewarding activity.
- Read to children frequently. Establish regular times for reading during the day, & find other opportunities to read.
- Help children to learn as you read. Offer explanations, make observations, & help the children to notice new information. Explain words that they may not know. Point out how the pictures in a book relate to the story. Talk about the characters' actions & feelings.
- Ask children questions as you read. Ask questions that help children connect the story with their own lives or that help them to compare the book with other books that they have read.
- Encourage children to talk about the book. Have a conversation with the children about the book you are reading. Answer their questions. Welcome their observations, & add to what they say.

- depends on the local champions promoting the benefits of essential workplace skills training, increasing public awareness, building partnerships, helping to assess local needs, and enlarging the scope of essential workplace skills training
- ensures the spiral of activity increases which makes sustainability possible.

Literacy Nova Scotia is seeing double! Since November 2002, the LNS has doubled its staff, welcoming a new Program Coordinator, as well as

a new Learner Coordinator and a Communications Coordinator.

The Learner Coordinator, Wendy manages the Learn Line, the toll-free number that provides information about adult upgrading and answers to other literacy inquiries. It also focuses on a project to initiate local and regional networking, and providing training opportunities for learners. Learners will be asked about their interests in public speaking, participation in meetings and leadership. A support plan for learners and a campaign to promote the Learn Line is also being developed.

The Communications Coordinator has developped a completely new image for the coalition in conjunction with our transfer in name from the Nova Scotia Provincial Literacy Coalition to Literacy Nova Scotia. A new logo representing the coalition and its mission is featured on promotional materials such as a newsletter, brochure, and business cards. These tools will help to increase awareness of the coalition and of literacy in the community.


Our Program Coordinator has organized professional development sessions for community-based literacy organizations. The need for increased professional development opportunities for literacy providers was identified, and as a result, LNS has offered eleven PD sessions this winter and spring. Plans for yearly PD sessions have also been made.

Family Literacy Day, January 27, kept the LNS busy distributing various promotional materials to over 30 community-based literacy organizations across the province. We expect to remain as active as the communications and learner developments continue, professional development sessions are held. Most recently the LNS bursary and Scholarships were awarded. The LNS bursary and scholarship awards three \$500 bursaries and two \$1500 scholarships each year to students in adult learning programs and those who have moved on to university or college after participating in an upgrading program.
