



Ontario Adult Literacy Curriculum Initiative COMMUNIQUE #4 - February 2010

The OALC is an MTCU led initiative operating under the umbrella of the three learning ministries. This is the fourth in a series of **official** communiqués to be distributed regularly between now and the scheduled implementation of the OALC in January 2011. Piloting Team

The CESBA team of Tony daSilva and Jane Barber, working with CCI Research Inc (<u>www.cci-research.com</u>), organized piloting in over 100 agencies across the province. See Communiqué # 3 for a full description of piloting process and participants.

Pilot Coordinator Training

A full-day Pilot Coordinator Training event was held on January 19, 2010 at the Courtyard by Marriott Hotel, Toronto. All sectors and streams were represented. Coordinators and representatives from the curriculum development team discussed the curriculum framework, the goals of the piloting exercise, roles and responsibilities of coordinators, timelines, and feedback mechanisms. The overall response to the materials and to training was positive.

Pilot Feedback Methodology

All participating practitioners from the pilot agencies will be asked to complete an online survey providing feedback concerning the framework. In addition, 30 practitioners will be asked to provide detailed feedback for the curriculum development team to use both in reviewing the work done to date and in the continued development of the remainder of the framework.

Piloting Schedule

External Validation

The Ontario Literacy Coalition in cooperation with the Ministry of Training Colleges and Universities is interviewing stakeholders to inform the development of the Ontario Adult Literacy Curriculum (OALC). These stakeholders include employer associations, labour organizations, training and education providers, and others whose clients may have literacy issues. These organizations have a stake in what adults learn and how their skills are assessed in the Literacy and Basic Skills Program of Employment Ontario. For example, employers might be looking for a reliable measure for entry-level skills. Unions wish need to ensure members have requisite skills to advance. Training organizations may receive learners from the LBS Program and wish to appropriately place them.

The new curriculum and assessment approach needs to meet the needs of various stakeholders, the public, and learners. To date, approximately 20 representative stakeholders have provided input to date. Areas for inquiry include:

- · standards for literacy program curriculum
- · reactions to the five transition pathways
- · the transition pathways, and exit points
- · reactions to the competencies
- · relationship of OALC and other educational credentials

In addition, these external stakeholders are being asked to provide their reaction to the competencies as well as a detailed description of one of the competencies showing tasks groups and tasks by level.

The Executive Directors Committee will be briefed in March on the key themes and the OALC Steering Committee will receive detailed information on the results for the validation process for consideration in future modifications of the OALC.

OALC Curriculum Development Team

The Curriculum Development team was struck in October 2008 to develop a new Curriculum Framework that will meet the needs of Ontario learners in the 21st century. The team was developed with representation from all sectors and streams and major representative agencies in the literacy field in Ontario. Jane Barber - CESBA

Jane Barber has been involved in adult literacy for more than 20 years as LBS instructor, program manager and independent consultant.
