## Did You Know ?

22% of Canadians have serious problems dealing with any printed materials.
62 % of Canadians do have numeracy skills to handle tasks of everyday life.

Less than 10 % of Canadians who would benefit from literacy upgrading actually enrol. Barriers include lack of childcare and transportation.

In 1995 the C.A.S.P. program in New Brunswick won the prestigious UNESCO literacy prize. C.A.S.P. stands for Community Academic Services Program which is community based adult literacy programs found in many cities and rural areas. It was born in 1991 and is primarily funded by Literacy New Brunswick INC. with local committees expected to provide about 10 % of class-room costs.

## **Cuba's Source of National Pride**

Mention Cuba and most Canadians think of resorts and beaches. But Cuba has another enviable aspect. It's literacy rate is estimated at 96 %. When Fidel Castro declared himself Commander in Chief after the revolution his first educational initiative was a literacy campaign. In 1960 25 % of Cuba's population could not read or write. A massive army of instructors was mobilized. High School and college students along with Teachers fanned out across the countryside armed with lesson books and lanterns. This also helped bridge the differences between cities and countryside. Interestingly the lessons in the manuals were relevant to life and labor experiences in the countryside. One of the lessons included having the learner be able to write a letter to Fidel Castro himself. Over 700,000 of these letters are stored in a museum today. In one year (1961) Cuba's literacy rate grew to 96 % from 75 %. where it it remains today. Cuba may have shortages thanks to embargoes, but the country has an abundance of persons who can read and write.

# Who Was Peter Gzowski and why is his name associated with Literacy?

Broadcaster, writer, editor, and literacy advocate Peter Gzowski died in 2002. He was a very versatile, engaging personality known for his patriotism, warmth, wit and unpretentious demeanor. From 1982 - 97 he was best remembered as the host of CBC morningside. He was passionate about literacy and founded the Peter Gzowski Invitational Golf Tournaments for literacy which are found in all provinces and territories. Proceeds from these tournaments help literacy programs including BSLN programs. BSLN has benefitted as a result of the PGI. Peter Gzowski, a Canadian and literacy icon.
